At A Barbershop in Downtown Colorado Springs

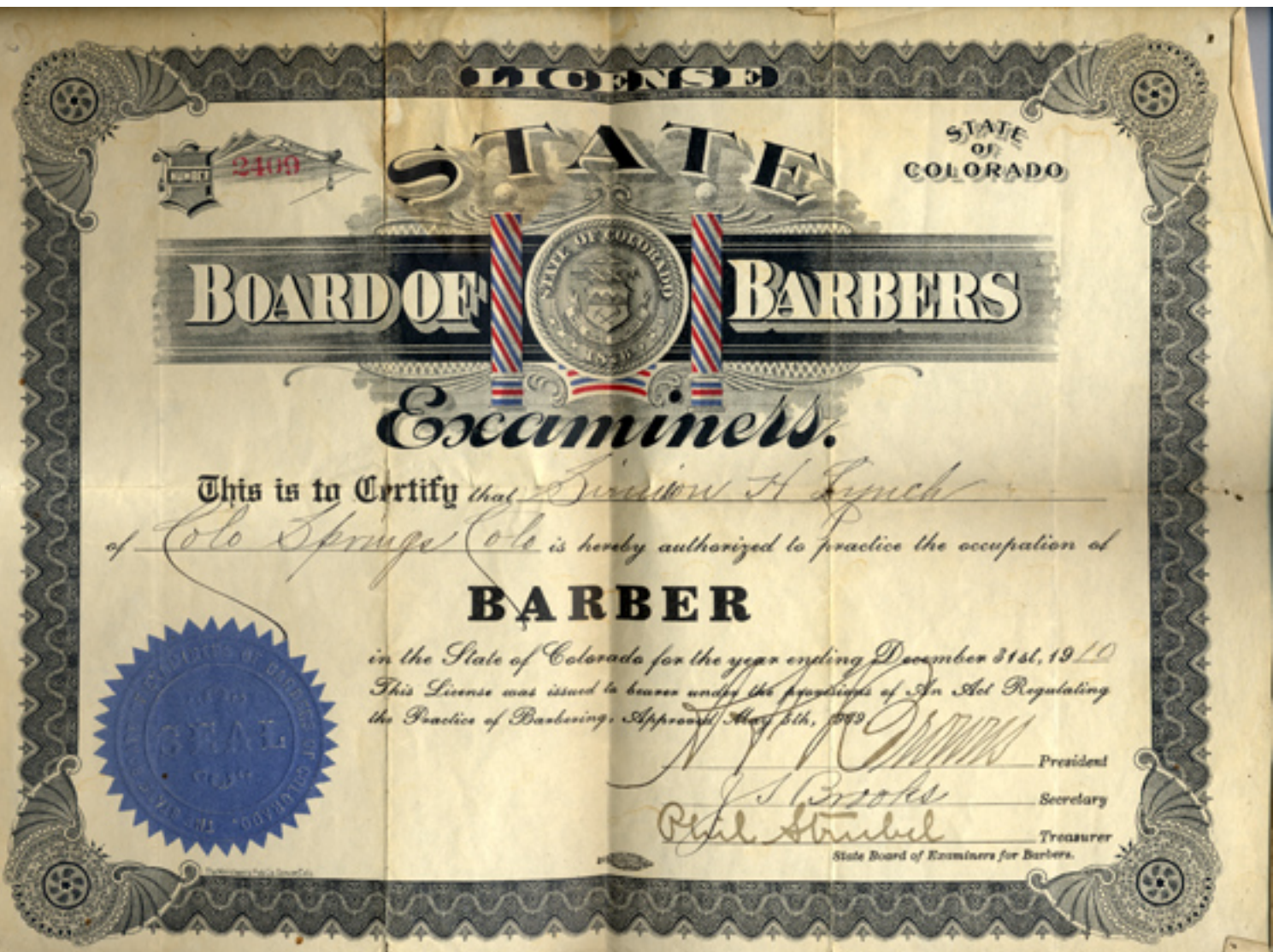
Became a barber as early as 1900

In the Gibson Township, Washington County 1900 Census is listed as working as a Barber. Sometime after 1910, the family moved to outside of Enid Oklahoma, where he labored for the grand sum of \$1 a day. In a notebook he kept a record of his daily wages, what he did, and also who he owed money to back in Indiana.

When their first son Jason was 7 years old, in about 1907, he developed tetanus after stepping on a nail, contracted tetanus, and rapidly died.

In the 1910 census, the family was living in Colorado Springs. Lucile was not quite 2 years old at the time.

I am guessing the above picture was taken in the 30's or 40's. Our dad, William O. Dickey was also working in a barber shop, and met Lucile in her dad's barber shop where she was working as a manicurist.



In his later years, Grandad Lynch volunteered and gave free haircuts to kids at the School of the Deaf in Colorado Springs.
